

The College has a good number of Ph.D. qualified staff members. The staff members have obtained their doctoral degrees from their research work carried out at prestigious institutes, such as IISc, IITs in India and in foreign universities as well.

- There are 15 recognised Ph.D. guides in the College and 29 research scholars working under them.
- The college also conducts workshops and seminars aimed at faculty development. In the last 5 years, the College has published more than 170 research papers in referred journals in national and international journals. The impact Factor of some of them is very high. Many members of the staff have presented papers at national and international conferences. One staff from the department of Chemistry Dr. Michael Rajamati has good number international publications in the area of Carobon Nano tubes to his credit and for his research contributions to society: Govt. Of Karnataka bestowed the sir CV Raman Young Scientist Award for Chemical Sciences on him.



- 6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly
 - Solarisation of the Campus: A first of its kind in South India, St. Joseph's College campus has installed a 100 KW roof top solar power system. This project was commissioned under Jawaharlal Nehru National Solar Mission covering roof area of 11000 sq ft. All types of loads at the campus from lights, lab equipment air conditioners. Lift and water pumps are powered by solar energy. On an average daily 425 KW h of power is generated during peak hours and the college is contributing in fighting global warming y reducing emission of 7600 kg CO2.
 - 2. Rain water harvesting: Roof top harvesting and Ground water recharging in place.
 - 3. Solid Waste Management: Solid waste segregation and disposal is effective in the campus.
 - 4. Use of ecofriendly materials on campus for publicity of events.
 - 5. Efforts for Carbon neutrality :The college in its effort to attain Carbon neutrality,has contributed 1500kg of paper waste for recycling which has saved 33 trees,39 kilo liters water,1MT carbon Dioxide reduction,675units energy and 1.7cubic meter land fill space since the last two years.
 - 6. Hazardous waste management : In order to minimize chemical and water consumption in the labs, "Green Chemistry" is practiced in labs. Utilization of toxic chemicals, acids and alkalis are reduced by carrying out the experiments in groups and usage of Carbon tetrachloride (CCl₄) and Chloroform (CHCl₃) is reduced to protect the ozone layer.
 - 7. **e-waste management :**E-waste is collected by the students and handed over to the private collection unit. Since 2012, 100 keyboards, 100 mice and 50 cables have been sent for recycling.

Any other:For Solid Waste Management Vermi-composting is being carried out in UG and PG blocks. A workshop on solid waste management by "One Bag and Two Bins System' was organized and **two Documentaries** around the theme "Keep the Campus Clean" were prepared by the students. A two bin system is being practiced in public places on campus. Plastic and paper wastes are segregated by the Hygiene Staff and they are allowed to sell the wastes to the recycling units. When the quantity of solid waste becomes large, it is disposed into the BBMP service tippers.

Old furniture (Desks and benches) of the college were donated to needy schools. Movements and rallies are an important part of raising environmental consciousness and the Swachh Bharat Pledge was taken by all students. Each final year student takesthe pledge of protecting the Environment on the occasion of Farewell Day Ceremony. Fumigation of the campus is done periodically to prevent the spread of Dengue and Chikungunya. Students of the Department of Environmental Science carry out projects about environmental issues. They have worked on topics such as

Phytoremediation of sewage using planted gravel filter system. Impact of cultural eutrophication on Bellandur lake, Bangalore.

- > History of water management in Bangalore.
- Veterinary biomedical waste management (A study on veterinary hospitals and clinics in urban Bangalore).
- > Carbon footprint of vegetable supply chain in Bengaluru.
- Study of fluorides in ground water-a case study of Bagepalli taluk.
- Study of urban heat islands in Bangalore city
- > Impact of municipal solid wastes and their management in Bangalore city.
